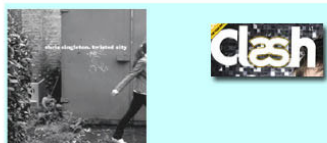

**MUSICIAN** Chris Singleton (pictured) is hoping his new album, *Twisted City*, will be more than an underground hit, even with its strong connections to the Tube.

During frequent visits to the capital, Dubliner Chris wrote the album on the back of boarding cards, Tube tickets or newspapers found at railway stations. It represents a Tube journey through London, with each song signifying a stop on the Underground.

In fitting style, Chris launched the album yesterday with performances at Leicester Square, London Bridge and Bank Tube stations. The CD is due for release on September 19.

Chris said: 'I wanted to write an album about my experiences in London, trying to make it as a musician. I spent a lot of time on the Tube and I don't think anything symbolises the city more.'

SINGER songwriter Chris Singleton is breaking the UK by playing open top buses, underground trains and even taxi cabs.

The Dubliner — whose debut album *Twisted Cities* is currently taking London by storm — has come up with a novel way of gigging.

Rather than playing half-full clubs and venues in the capital city, Chris has been serving up his music on the Tube, on open-topped buses and in black taxis.

He said: "It's called the Twisted Tour of London and basically it's playing live music on the public transport system in Greater London.

"We have done double decker tour buses and tubes and now we plan to play the back of a taxi with a full band. The audience will be made up of two competition winners

ing to Zutons frontman Dave McCabe treated his band like dirt. He said: "We were made up to be playing with the lads. Liverpoolians and Dubliners always get on well so we thought we'd have a laugh.

"But they treated us like we were part of the crew, and barely acknowledged us.

"They acted like they were the best thing since the bloody Beatles — but where are they now?"

"There won't be much space and I suppose when the meter runs out the show is over."

Talented Chris moved to London two years ago, hoping to break into the English music market.

And despite settling in across the water Chris's heart belongs firmly in Dublin.

He said: "Sure there are more opportunities over here but there is so much more competition.

"I do miss Dublin and it is amazing how much it has changed in the short time I have been away.

"Pubs I used to go to regularly are gone or have been turned into a superclub.

"And I find London a bit intense."

## WHO THE HELL IS ?

**Tube trip:** New to London? Don't know your way round the city? Then let Dubliner Chris Singleton take you by the hand and lead you through the streets of London – or, more accurately, through the London Underground. Ever since Singleton started going to London to visit his girlfriend, he has been fascinated with the tube, and his debut album, *Twisted City*, takes the listener on a sort of magical mystery tube tour, each song representing a different stop on the line and exploring Chris's different impressions of life and love in this sprawling metropolis. *Twisted City* opens with the sound of a train departure announcement – could this signal the start of Chris Singleton's own journey to pop glory?

**Paper trail:** This young Dubliner's musical journey began with the summery, psychedelic sounds of The Beatles, Pink Floyd and The Kinks, and the glam-rock stomp of T. Rex, The Sweet and David Bowie. The 1960s and '70s influences are apparent in such songs as *Worry Number One*, *Stop Following* and new single *Get Up*, but there are also nods to such respected songsmiths as Andy Partridge and Neil Finn. Singleton scribbled the album's lyrics on the backs of train tickets, airplane boarding cards and pieces of paper he picked up along the

way. He also played, recorded and produced the album, and even set up his own record label to release it.

**Noise annoys:** Chris's music was never destined to be dull or monochrome; he experiences a rare phenomenon called synaesthesia, in which sounds and words become a kaleidoscope of colours in his head. He also has a rather less benign ear condition, hyperacusis, which causes him to find everyday noise painful and unbearable. You'd imagine London – or a recording studio – would be the last place someone with an allergy to sound would want to be, but Chris's love of music won the day, and he mastered his ailment long enough to master the album in Abbey Road studios.

**Launch platform:** Chris launched the album – where else? – on the tube, and the record quickly garnered positive reviews from the underground and overground press. *The Daily Express* called it "an express train of emotions", and *The Ticket* likened it to Paul McCartney when he was fab. And on the day he launched the album, ITV ran a news feature on Cathy with the catchy, well-crafted pop tunes. It wasn't long before Universal Music Group caught wind of this new talent and signed the young Dubliner up to a distribution deal in Ireland and the UK. Chris releases a new single, *Get Up*, on brown Paper/Universal at the end of this month. He's also doing a few dates in London with a band that includes keyboardist Andy Fleet, drummer Joe "JC" Caddy, Spanish bassist Zane Maerrens and Cypriot guitarist Stelios Kaspides.

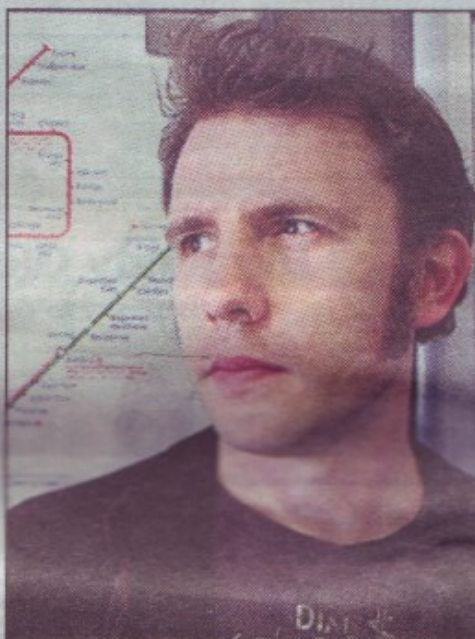

## Chris is snap happy for Beatles

**D**UBLIN-BORN Chris Singleton is the latest Irish singer-songwriter tipped for the top. His debut album, *Twisted City*, a concept album based around stories on the London Underground, has gained plaudits in all the right places with its mixture of melody, intelligence and sonic innovation and idiosyncrasy.

Just as a lot of people think there's something special about Chris, his object of desire is also exceptional and has value beyond his own personal emotional investment. As he explains, the most precious item he possesses is an early photograph that marks the occasion of the very first meeting between John Lennon and Paul McCartney.

"The actual photo is of John Lennon the day he met Paul McCartney in St Peter's Woolton Parish Church in Liverpool," says Chris. "It was taken on July 6, 1957. It's a picture of Lennon on stage with the Quarrymen, the band he was in before The Beatles. The photo is off the original negative and is signed by the photographer, Chris Rhind, so there's a value to it in monetary terms, but because my interest in music was kickstarted by hearing *Revolver* when I was 11, the photo has all kinds of other resonance for me, too."

Lennon, he was introduced to McCartney. Paul played him Eddie Cochran's *Twenty Flight Rock* and Lennon was sufficiently impressed by what he heard that he invited Paul to join The Quarrymen.

On October 18, 1957, Paul McCartney made his debut with The Quarrymen.

"When you throw into this mix the fact that the photograph was a present from my mother on my 25th birthday — she knew a friend of Chris Rhind and managed to persuade him to part with it — then you can see just how valuable the thing is to me personally. She gave it to me before I left for London to try to make it as a musician."

Chris has a very Catholic taste in music and cites the likes of Bowie and Marc Bolan, along with The Velvet Underground and Bob Dylan as influences besides The Beatles. He also spent a lot of time singing in choirs as he was growing up and still appreciates the training in harmony and musical arrangements his choir singing has given him.

He was also learning classical piano before he decided to pick up a guitar.

"My dad is a musician and he was in a lot of bands in the 60s, so there was always a lot of music on in the house," says Chris. "I played in some bands when I was in Trinity College as well, but I suppose the big move for me was going to London four years ago. There was something about the sound of *Revolver*, though, that was so different to anything else I'd heard up to then. I know now about all those tape loops, compressed drums and backward guitars, but when I was 11 it was like an alarm bell went off in my head."

It wasn't all plain sailing for Chris once he had settled in London. One of the biggest and somewhat unusual obstacles he had to overcome was an acute hearing affliction called hyperacusis. Chris found he couldn't bear loud noises of any description. To make matters worse,

much of the advice he received about how to treat the illness was of the wrong variety.

"Essentially, I developed an over-sensitivity to sound, possibly through listening to music too loud," says Chris. "For two years, everyday noises seemed horrendously harsh. The worst offenders were things like toilet flushes, showers, telephones and bus brakes. The way I dealt with it — and the worst way to deal with it in most cases — was by wearing earplugs. This just makes the problem worse, as when you take the earplugs out, everything seems even louder than when you put the plugs in."

"Eventually, I got really good treatment on the NHS in England. I got hearing therapy, which is a mix of hearing tests and hearing counselling. I was really sceptical about this at first, because I couldn't see how a 'hearing shrink' was going to help matters, but actually it was brilliant. I just needed reassurance that there was nothing permanently wrong with my hearing, good advice about not wearing earplugs, and some relaxation techniques. The problem was that I had convinced myself my ears were effectively 'broken', and the more I thought this, the worse things got. Once I got some reassurance that my ears were OK, they started being OK."

In spite of having hyperacusis during the making of the album, Chris nevertheless delivered the extremely impressive *Twisted City*.

"The album is loosely conceived as a tube journey through London," says Chris. "Every song is a stop on the line and is about a place, person or experience in the city. It's a concept album in the loosest sense of the word, but it does have a very 'travel' or 'London' theme to it. There are lots of tube noises on it, too. I went down into the Underground with a microphone and minidisc recorder, so there's snippets of conversations, closing doors, train departure announcements and so on on it. I looked like a nutter doing it."

"Launching the album on the London Underground helped attract a lot of attention in the UK and then this travelled across to Ireland. My ambitions for the future are really just caught up in touring *Twisted City*. I'm playing gigs in some other strange places, such as a bus. There will be further single releases later in the year and I'm looking forward to coming back to play *Crawdaddy* in April in Dublin. I'll also be recording some new tracks in Berlin later this year."

## Irish singer's Twisted version of life in London

DUBLIN singer-songwriter Chris Singleton was not busking when he performed on London's Underground yesterday – he was promoting his new album.

Commuters were given a taste of 'Twisted City', an album conceived as a tube ride through the British capital, with each song about a stop on the journey and a particular place or person.

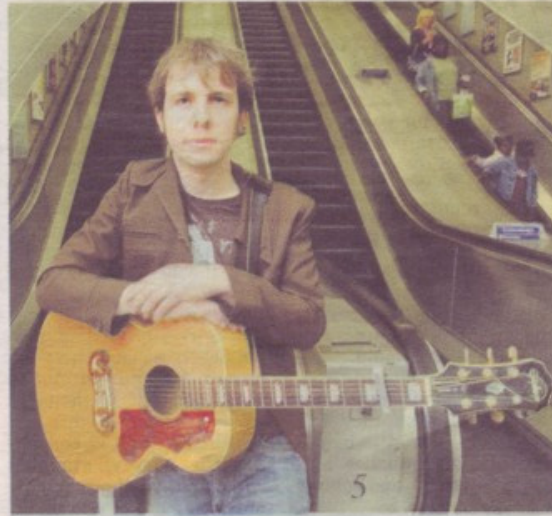
The singer, pictured right, who lives in Stoke Newington in London, was signed by major record label Universal, who are releasing his

#### New release?

*Northern Lights* by Philip Pullman – an absolutely beautifully told story, complete with very well-written polar bears.

*Magnolia* – the film is based around Aimee Mann's songs, which I love. And I think any film which manages to make a sequence of frogs falling from the sky a central part of the plot deserves to be lavished with praise.

#### Rental/Old Classic?

*Some Like it Hot* is a corker of an old classic. Marilyn Monroe shows some real comic genius in that.

In Dublin, obviously. Or failing that, a musician's mag, *Sound on Sound*, which has lots of pictures of guys with beards and mixing desks.

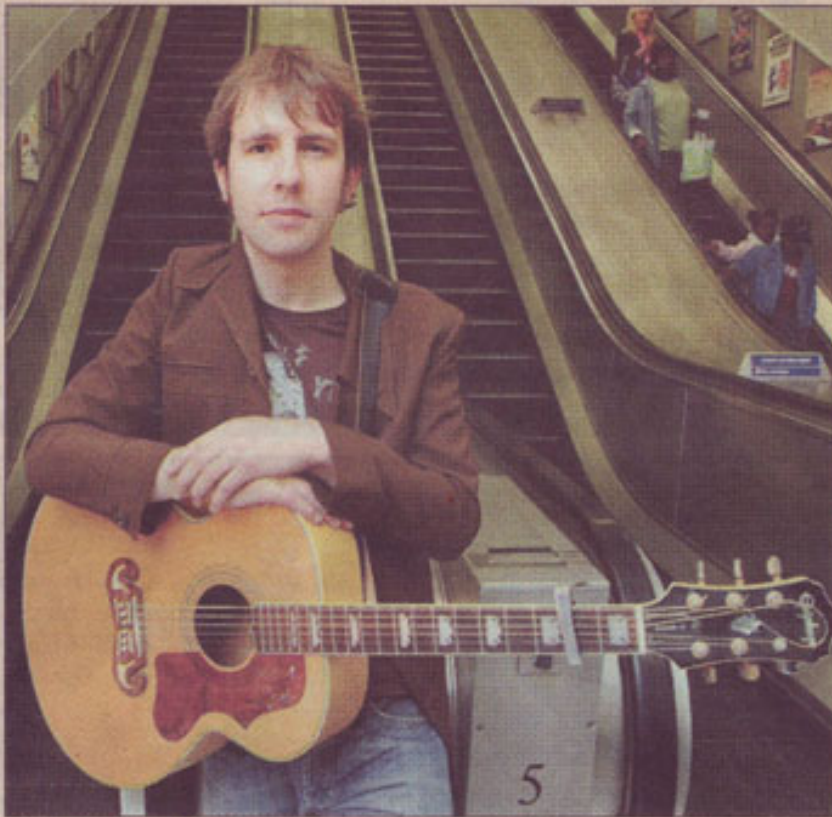
